INFORMATION NOTE FOR PARTICIPANTS

(I) Venue

1. The joint ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Vienna Convention for the Protection of the Ozone Layer and the Twenty-third Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer will be held from 21 to 25 November 2011 in Bali, Indonesia at the following venue:

(II) Visas information for Indonesia

2. The following information has been based on information available at the official website of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Government of Indonesia:
<http://www.deplu.go.id/Pages/ServiceDisplay.aspx?IDP=7&IDP2=7&Name=ConsularService&l=en> and other official Government sources.

3. The Department of Foreign Affairs i.e. Directorate of Consular Affairs provides visa authorization to enter Indonesia for diplomatic and service / official visa. The request for diplomatic and service / official visa should be submitted to the Indonesian Embassies and Consulate-Generals or Consulates overseas (<http://www.kemlu.go.id/Pages/Mission.aspx?l=en> or <http://www.kemlu.go.id/Pages/Links.aspx?l=en> or see annex I). The request needs to include a visa application form, available at Indonesian Embassies and Consulate-Generals or Consulates overseas (an example of which can be found in annex II), along with the enclosures, as follows:

- Applicant's recent photograph, 2 (two) color, size 4x6 cm photographs;
- Diplomatic or service/ official passport valid for at least 6 (six) months on the date of entry;
- Diplomatic Note explaining his/her diplomatic assignment (for diplomatic visa) or official assignment (for service/ official visa).
- Indonesian Embassies and Consulate-Generals or Consulates may request the applicants to provide further clarification, if needed.

The application for diplomatic and service / official visa can not submitted by other parties on behalf of the applicant.

4. Citizens from certain countries are eligible for acquiring their visas on arrival. There are three types of visa that fall under this category, Visa for Holders of Diplomatic and Service/Official/ Special Passports, Visa On Arrival (VOA) and Visa-Free Short Visits.

5. Participants bearing diplomatic or service/official/special passports from the following countries and special administrative regions are exempted from the requirement to own a visa for a short term visit to Indonesia. The participants will be eligible for an entry permit upon arrival at any international airports and seaports in Indonesia without charge: Austria, Azerbaijan, Brazil, Cambodia, Croatia, Cuba, Ecuador, India, Iran, Myanmar, North Korea, Paraguay, Peru, Russia, Serbia, South Korea and Turkey.

6. In accordance with the Director of Immigration, Bulgaria, Lao, Mongolia, Myanmar, Slovakia, Sri Lanka, Switzerland, Tunisia and Vietnam are also included in the list of free visa agreement.

7. The VOA can be obtained directly upon arrival, regardless of the purpose of the visit (business/tourist). VOA is neither a work visa nor a visit visa. Therefore, it can not be extended or converted into another immigration permit. The maximum stay permitted is 30 days. The countries which are eligible for this type of visa are listed under annex III.

8. The general requirements for visa on arrival are:

- a. The applicant's passport must be valid for at least six months from the date of entry.
- b. Round-trip airplane ticket.
- c. Fees of US\$10 for up to seven days and US\$25 for up to 30 days.

9. Additionally, the following countries do not require a visa to enter Indonesia for a visit of up to 30 days (known as Visa-Free Short Visits): Brunei Darussalam, Chile, Laos, Malaysia, Morocco, Peru, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam and the Chinese special administrative regions of Hong Kong and Macao.

10. For participants entitled for Visa on Arrival and Visa Exemption facilities, they may arrive through the following international airports among others:

- a. Soekarno – Hatta International Airport, Jakarta
- b. Ngurah Rai International Airport, Bali

11. Please be advised that Visa-Free Short Visits may only be extended upon approval from the Minister of Justice and Human Rights/Director General of Immigration of the Republic of Indonesia based on natural disaster, illness or accident, but cannot be transferred to another type of visa.

12. Visitors who overstay their visa are subjected to fines and/or prison sentences.

(III) Airport reception and transportation to and from hotels

13. A welcome area, fast-track visitors' entry and information desk will be set up at Ngurah Rai International Airport in Bali to assist participants arriving for the Conference.

14. A shuttle bus service between Ngurah Rai International Airport and the officially recommended hotels of the session will be available free of charge to participants. Taxi and rental cars are also available at the airport.

(IV) Hotel accommodation and transport to the Conference Centre

15. Participants are responsible for making their own accommodation arrangements. The list of hotels can be found in annex IV of this document. It is up to each participant to book their hotel accommodation directly with the hotels as soon as possible to take advantage of preferred accommodation. To qualify for the special rates, delegates should also indicate at the time of booking that they are participating in a United Nations meeting, specifically the Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol.

16. Shuttle buses will transport participants to and from the officially recommended hotels in the mornings and evenings during the session.

(V) Health requirements and medical facilities

17. A Medical Room is available at ground floor of the conference venue near the Plenary. There are first aid facilities that include a paramedic, a doctor and an ambulance. The hospital nearest to the venue is the Surya Husada Hospital located in Sili Gita, an area opposite the Nusa Dua area, about two kilometers from BNDCC (10 minutes by ambulance).

(VI) Local currency and payment facilities

18. The currency unit of Indonesia is the rupiah. Banknotes are issued in dominations of 1,000; 2,000; 5,000; 10,000; 20,000; 50,000 and 100,000; there are also coins in denominations of 100; 500 and 1,000. The exchange rate is approximately Rp 9, 000 = US\$ 1.

19. Major credit cards (Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Diners Club) and traveler's cheques in principal currencies are generally accepted in large hotels, restaurants, department stores and several large stores. Traveler's cheques and bank notes in all major currencies may be exchanged at all commercial banks and most hotels and foreign exchange counters. ATM services are also available.

(VII) Weather and local time information

20. Indonesia's tropical climate is characterized by high daytime temperatures and high humidity. In the lowlands, the temperature ranges between 21° and 31 C and the humidity between 60 and 100 per cent. During the wet season, tropical showers and thunderstorms are frequent, with rain falling in short, intense bursts. In West Indonesia, the wet season runs from November to April, and the dry season from April to October. East Indonesia has two wet seasons, which differ from place to place.

21. Just 8° south of the equator, Bali has a tropical climate which is hot all year. The average temperature hovers around 30°C (mid-80s°F) year-round. November falls under the wet season, in which rain is frequent.

22. Indonesia has three time zones. Sumatra, Java, West and Central Kalimantan are in West Indonesia time, seven hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT +07:00). Bali, South and East Kalimantan, Sulawesi and Nusa Tenggara are in Central Indonesia time (GMT +08:00). Maluku and Irian Jaya are in East Indonesia time (GMT +09:00).

(VIII) Geography and population

23. Located between two continents and two oceans, Indonesia is the world's largest archipelagic nation. The island chain forms an arc of 5,000 kilometers long between mainland South-East Asia and Papua New Guinea, endowing Indonesia with more than 80,000 kilometers of coastline and 3.1 million square kilometers of territorial waters.

24. The geology and landscape of Indonesia were formed millions of years ago by the collision of three geodesic plates. Dotted with volcanoes that are covered with thick tropical vegetation and bright-green rice fields and surrounded by coral reefs, Indonesia is a place of unsurpassed beauty. The archipelago varies in landscape and climate, from wet and lush in the west to dry and arid on many of the eastern islands.

25. With over 220 million citizens, Indonesia is the world's fourth most populous country.

26. The island of Bali is one of the country's 33 provinces and is world-renowned as one of the most beautiful and diverse tourist areas in Asia. Bali is also known for its highly developed arts, including dance, sculpture, painting, leather-and metalworking and music. Although the majority of Indonesians are Muslim, about 92 per cent of the residents of Bali practice Balinese Hinduism, a syncretism of local beliefs and Hindu influences from mainland Asia.

(IX) Other practical information

27. Some 300 different languages are spoken across the archipelago. The official language of Indonesia is Bahasa Indonesia, a modern variant of Malay that has long served as the lingua franca of trade in Indonesia. In Bali the most widely spoken languages are Balinese and Bahasa Indonesia, although many residents also speak English because of the island's important tourism industry.

28. In terms of security, the crime rate in Bali is low; however, basic security measures and precautions should always be taken, such as locking valuables in the hotel safe and paying particular attention to laptops, cameras and phones.

29. The electric power in Indonesia is 220-230V running at 50Hz and the plug type used is a C - 2 parallel prongs - "French" type, the drawing of which can be seen overleaf. Delegates are strongly encouraged to carry their own adapter for use with laptops and other electrical appliances as the Secretariat will not be able to provide these. In case of need, adapters can be purchased from shops in the city dealing in electronic and electrical items.

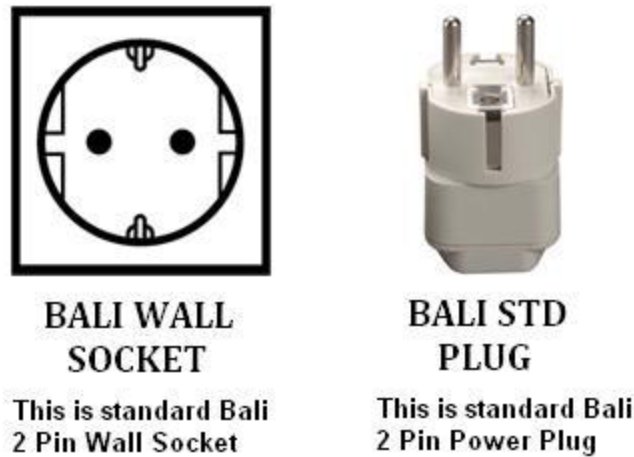


Figure 1: Illustration of the electrical socket and plugs in Bali, Indonesia

30. Telephone services are available in hotels, restaurants and cafes. Pre-paid mobile telephone cards are available at hotels and local shops. Dialing is as follows:

- a. Local calls: dial the number directly.
- b. Long-distance calls within Indonesia: dial the area code (for Jakarta 021, for Bali 0361) + the number
- c. International calls: dial the international direct dial access (001, 007, 008, 009, 017) + country code + area code + number;

31. To call Indonesia from abroad, dial the international direct dial access + 62 (country code) + area code + number. When calling from abroad, the 0 prefix of the area code should not be dialed.

33. Flight information may be obtained by calling Soekarno-Hatta International Airport on (62 21) 550 5307 - 09; 550 5179 or Ngurah Rai International Airport on (62 361) 751 011 ext. 5121 (arrival) and 5123 (departure).

34. Postal and facsimile facilities are available at post offices and in most major hotels. Internet services are also available at most major hotels, cybercafes in Nusa Dua and the Bali Nusa Dua Convention Center. Courier Services are available in the exhibition hall in from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m during week days.

35. Should participants wish to do a bit a shopping , less than five minutes by Shuttle from the venue, there is a shopping area called Bali Collection hosting, among other things, an art shop, a craft shop, a large department store, a supermarket, restaurants and a spa. There is also an Art and Craft Market about five minutes walking distance from the venue, where there are several souvenir shops and restaurants. For those willing to travel a bit further, there is a Duty Free Shop at Mall Bali Galeria, about 30 minutes by taxi from BNDCC. The nearest local souvenir shop is Krisna Souvenir shop located at Tuban Area, near Ngurah Rai Airport.

36. There are several food outlets in BNDCC. There are three restaurants, the Jimbaran Restaurant on the Ground Floor, the Seminyak Lounge at the Mezaninne and an Indonesian food restaurant near the Uluwatu room also on the Ground floor. There are also a couple of snack bars on the Ground Floor and Mezaninne . Outside the conference venue, there are various restaurants at Bali Collection and the Art and Craft Market (see paragraph 35). Additionally, there is the Jalan Pantai Mengiat (about five minutes by taxi), the Nusa Dua Entrance (walking distance of about five minutes), and two Ulam Restaurants within a ten minute drive.

37. For those interested in playing a game of golf, the Bali Golf & Country Club is located in the Nusa Dua area about 1,5 kilometers from BNDCC. It is unique in that golfers enjoy two distinctly different nine holes. On the front nine drive off into rain forest clad hills, moving onward to spectacular vistas over the ocean to the volcanic mountains of east Bali. 38. A value added tax of 10 per cent is added to bills. It is common in larger cities for 5 per cent to be added for service in restaurants. Tipping is not compulsory, even in cities, but it is generally highly appreciated if tip is given no more than 20 per cent of the price paid.

40. Every hotel should have tourist information packages and should be able to advise participants on this matter.

(XI) Registration and identification name badges

41. To facilitate the issuance of identification badges and avoid unnecessary delays at the meeting venue, it is strongly recommended that delegations submit their nominations and pre-register all participants in advance of the meeting in order to anticipate preparation of identity cards and minimize waiting time at the registration desk and inconvenience for high-level representatives upon arrival. Participants can pre-register themselves and their delegations online through the conference portal for the meeting at: <http://conf.montreal-protocol.org/meeting/mop23-cop9> from Monday, 19 September 2011.

42. Registration on site will begin at 10 a.m. on Sunday, 20 November 2011 and continue until Thursday, 24 November 2011.

43. Delegates are reminded that the list of participants is based on the information provided by them at the time of registration, and that inclusion on the list of participants is conditional upon official registration. On the fourth day of the meeting, the provisional list of participants will be circulated via the paperless system and delegates are encouraged to check their and their delegations' details for accuracy and completeness.

44. As part of the high-level security arrangements, all participants are required to produce their invitations and/or official documents identifying them as delegates, along with a passport, for initial admission into the Bali Nusa Dua Convention Center. The identity badges issued at registration must be worn visibly at all times in the Conference Centre and will be required for admission into the meeting rooms. All persons and bags will be screened at the entrance to the Convention Center.

(XII) Financial assistance to developing countries

45. Limited funds are available to assist the participation of representatives of Parties that are developing countries and countries with economies in transition. If your Government requires such assistance, then a written request should be sent to the Secretariat by 14 October 2011.

(XIII) Opening of the meeting

47. The joint Ninth Conference of the Parties to the Vienna Convention for the Protection of the Ozone Layer and the Twenty-third Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer will open at 10 a.m. on Monday, 21 November 2011. The morning sessions of the meetings will be held from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and afternoon sessions from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m., unless otherwise specified by the Secretariat during the meetings.

(XIV) Paperless system

48. The Secretariat uses a paperless system to process conference-room papers and provide access to meeting documents and other general information during the meetings. As advised in prior meetings, participants with access to a laptop are strongly urged to carry it.

49. As per before, please note that the paperless system is a web-based system and this means the only requirement is a laptop that has a wireless capability (to connect to the WiFi network at the conference venue) and a browser (to access the paperless system - e.g. Internet Explorer or Firefox or Netscape); no software will be installed on the laptops, so administrator access to the laptop is not required. Participants will not require any password to access the paperless system.

50. Delegations participating in closed contact groups will, however, be assigned passwords to access the private shared workspace of that contact group. Support staff will be on hand during the registration process and throughout the meetings to provide assistance as necessary.

(XV) Meeting documents and language services

51. All pre-session documents will be distributed to the official address that has been provided by parties to the Ozone Secretariat, by post or by e-mail as specified by each party, in the United Nations language preferred by the party. In any case, all documents will also be available for downloading from the conference portal for the meeting <http://conf.montreal-protocol.org/meeting/mop23-cop9> as they become available.

52. Working documents for the meeting will be translated into all six United Nations languages, namely Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish. Information notes and background documents will be made available in their original language (usually English).

53. Simultaneous interpretation will be available in plenary for the sessions of the joint meetings in the six languages of the United Nations. Interpretation services will not be available for regional or group meetings.

The prices are per room and inclusive of breakfast for two people.

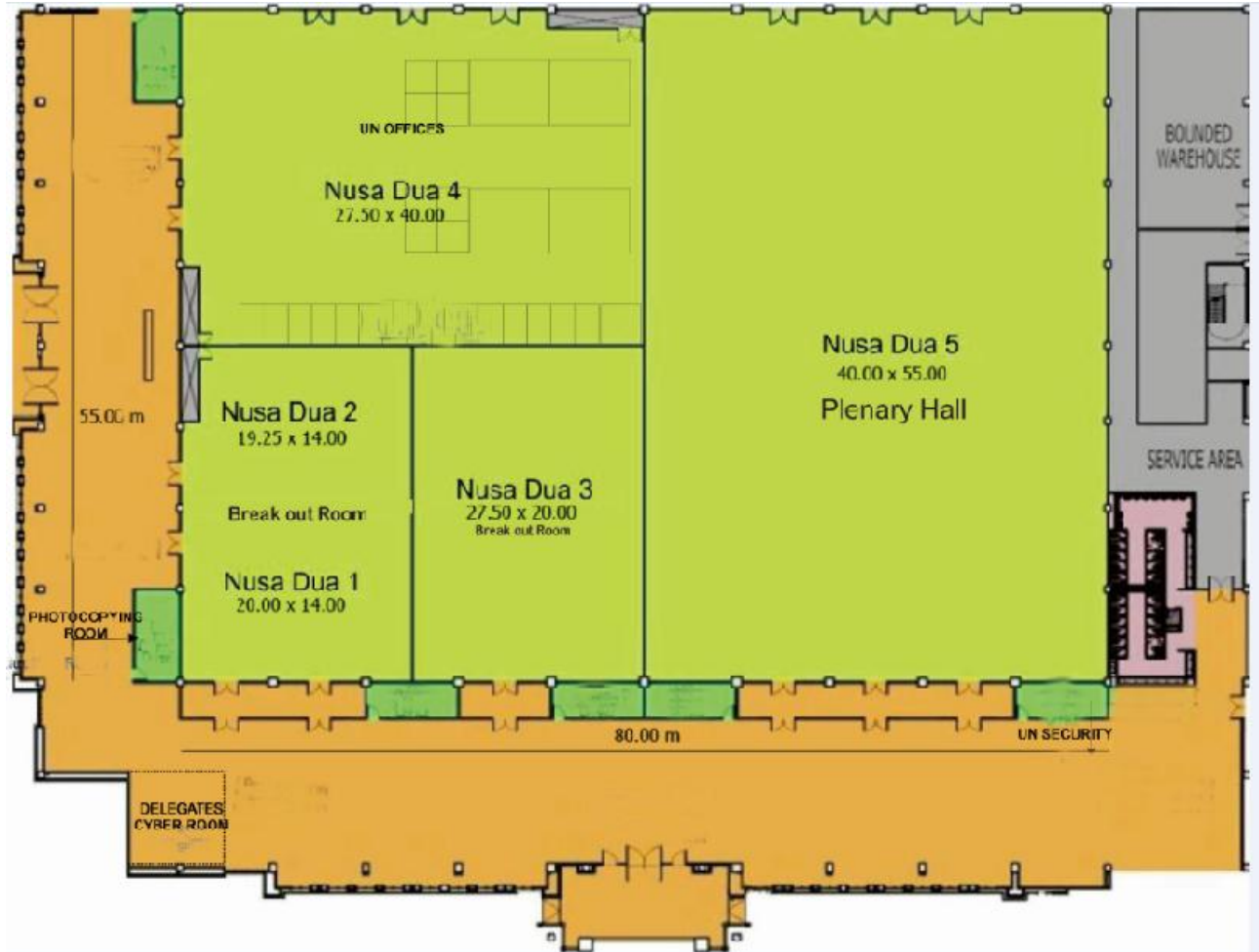

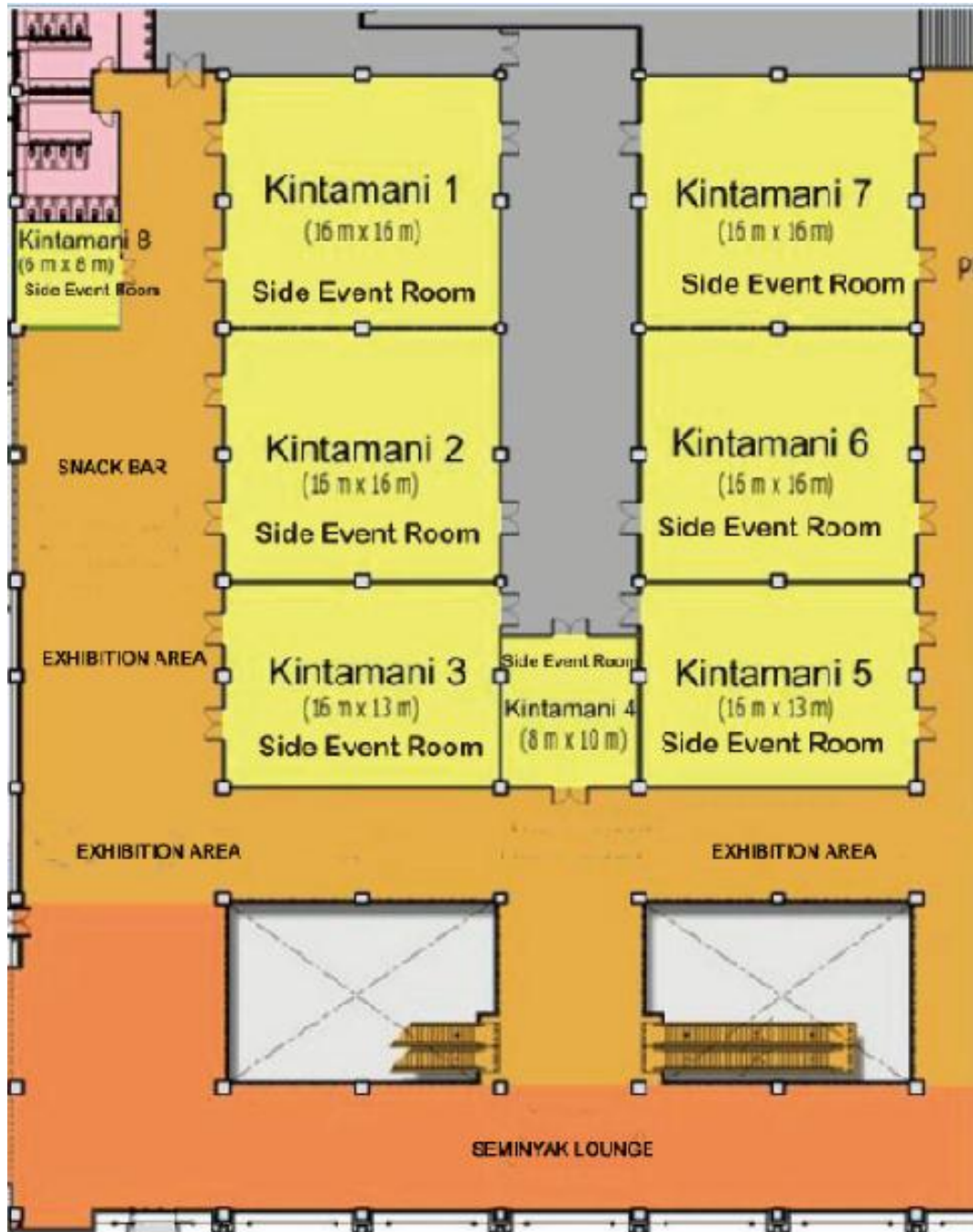
